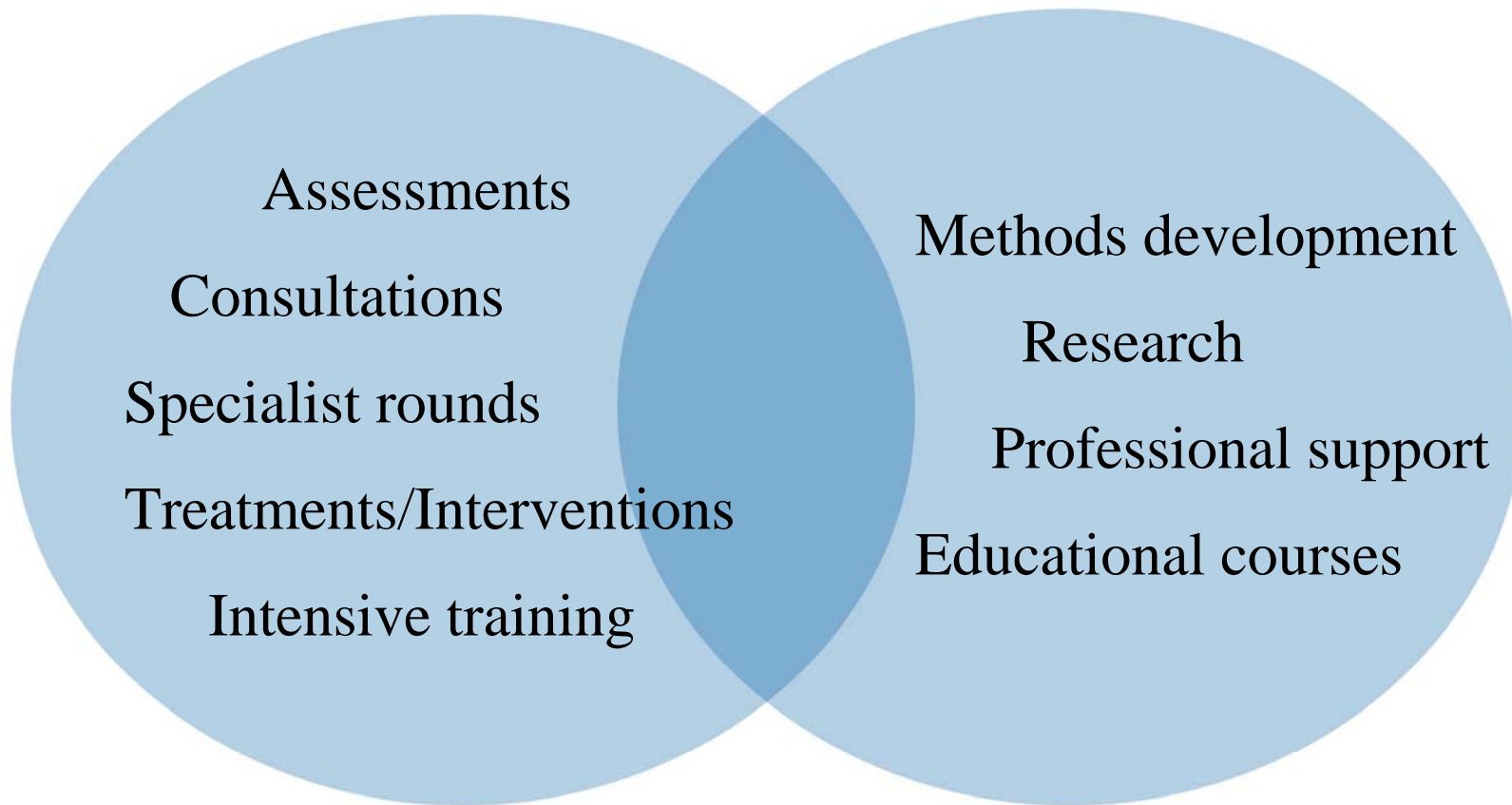

Assessment – Research and Development – Education



FBH offers individually tailored and targeted interventions in accordance with referrals.

FBH houses staff with specific competence in children and adolescents with communication problems, eating problems, problems with motor and sensory function, and learning disabilities.

FBH houses KOMIC – a regional communication and computer resource centre.

The activities primarily target children and adolescents with

- cerebral palsy
- myelomeningocele
- unusual malformation syndromes
- acquired brain injuries caused by trauma, tumours, epilepsy or other causes
- neuromuscular diseases

Traditionally FBH covers the age of 0-20 years.

In certain contexts we also deal with young adults up to the age of 25 years.

Examples of interventions

- assessment and treatment of communication problems
- assessment and treatment of eating problems
- assessment and treatment of learning disabilities
- assessment and treatment of spasticity
- post-operative treatment and training
- rehabilitation after acquired brain injury
- three-dimensional walking analysis
- trying out computer-based equipment
- uro-intestinal habilitation

In consultation with FBH, some interventions may take place in the child's local environment.
